The Fine Arts program is designed to help students attain full development as visionaries in both a general arts context and within the framework of art's history and philosophy.

Students are encouraged to create a personal style and a critical approach to the solution of individual problems, by exploring 2 and 3 dimensional media and forms. An annual art exhibit is an integral part of the program. By choosing suitable electives, students may prepare themselves for graduate studies or for careers in art production, scholarly research, art education, art reporting, graphic and industrial design, book illustration, theatre, or the management of art enterprises.

As Mark Rothko implied, art is not to be confined to picturesque representations that decorate the walls of museums or private residences, but it is a serious discipline that joins poetry and philosophy in dealing with the principal preoccupations of humanity, with reality itself.

David Maes · Workshop

David's work has always been concerned with the representation of the human body and more specifically the portrait. He says, "I use 'traditional' means of expression to arrive at a 'contemporary' representation of the people whom I frequent or meet during my travels. It is my hope that in concentrating on the specificity of each person I portray, I touch upon that part of him or her which is universal."

Drawing from life is at the heart of his creative process. It allows him to apprehend the world and renew his vocabulary of forms. His work is about seeing, but ultimately it is also about his relationship to others. The ambition of art, in his view, is to help us to reconcile ourselves with the complexity of the world and eventually contribute to an understanding of who we are.

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
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




printmaking · ART334

front Mayada Al Sawaf top back Omar Karim · bottom back Assaad Salameh

This studio course investigates the principals and techniques of printmaking. It covers a general background history of printmaking. Emphasis is placed on the creative exploration of various processes including: intaglio (etching, aquatint, imprint), linoleum cuts, woodcuts, color separation techniques, and monotypes.







painting I · ART341

An introduction to painting with an emphasis on the tools, techniques, and materials of painting. Students will be exposed to different modes of compositional organization of the artistic image. Painting of models (human and still life) is accompanied by analysis of historical and contemporary artworks.







painting II · ART342

This studio course is an intermediate course that furthers the skills and concepts covered in Painting I through the use of acrylic and oil painting techniques and approaches. This course looks into a variety of methodologies for understanding subject rendering and space interpretation. Based on the analysis of existing works, students will create unique compositions around topics relevant to their research.






sculpture II · ART352

front & back Demy Kanaan

This intermediate studio course involves the research and development of materials and processes to expand the student's individual approach and method of expression in 3D production. Students will be introduced to different approaches to sculpture from traditional modes of expression to contemporary concepts, and are encouraged to explore spatial factors and potential solutions to complex formal issues. Special emphasis is placed on the realization of free standing sculptures in relation to specific site conditions and cultural contexts.

This is an advanced painting course where concepts and techniques from various modern movements are explored and studied for their influence on the development of contemporary art. Students will build upon this acquired knowledge through conceptual interpretations and personal research in developing their own aesthetic language and work.






sculpture I · ART351

This course provides an introduction to the basic concepts, materials, and processes of sculpture. It is based on fundamental notions of composition in space, formal perception, and projection. The course emphasizes the understanding of traditional and contemporary notions and techniques through providing students with the ability to realize three-dimensional works based on simple subject matter through modeling, casting, and carving.





senior studies · ART499

front & back Serene Ghandour

This senior course provides for the independent initiation and execution of final visual art project. It allows for greater personal research in the development of a personal idiom.

Students are encouraged to develop highly personal projects and are guided through experimentation and accomplishment in their media of choice, eventually leading to a final project. The course emphasis is on enlarging and solidifying the student's background and defining their direction in Art making.

This course explores the structural and muscular systems of the human body with emphasis on proportion, anatomical relations, contour, volume, and foreshortening.

Students develop the figure in different spatial situations as an exploration of expression in drawing. This course aims at producing full-fledged compositions in various drawing media. Throughout the course, the students will be exposed to aesthetic issues, problem solving in composition, and the choice of appropriate materials.







studio photography · PHO301

This advanced course examines the use of photography in a studio environment. Through an extended studio process, students will create authentic work using studio lighting, medium format, advanced photographic software, image manipulation and large printing output. They will gain a broader understanding of photography as an artistic medium and will acquire the practical skills and approaches necessary to comfortably enter the marketplace.
